Spring Brings New Driving Hazards

Winter may be most known for its treacherous driving conditions, but spring also can be a difficult season for driving. From wind and rain to wildlife emerging from hibernation, spring driving can be challenging in its own right.

Beware of potholes

Winter often leaves its mark by creating or enlarging potholes in the road, which are no friend to your car or safety. Keep a look out for these unexpected obstacles, and drive around them if safe to do so.



Construction Zones

Spring is often the time when road work begins or resumes, so expect construction. For everyone's safety, slow down to posted speeds when approaching construction zones and be prepared to stop. Obey all signs and workers who are directing traffic.

Farm Equipment

When sharing the road with farm equipment remember to slow down, watch for signals, allow for slow turns and pass carefully.

Severe Weather

If the weather should turn ugly, which has been known to happen in spring, know when you need to pull off the road and seek shelter. If you get caught in severe weather that makes driving hazardous, find a safe place to park until weather conditions improve.

Share the road with motorcycles.

Because of their speed and size, motorcycles may quickly come in and out of your blind spots. Always take a second look now that motorcycles are out on the road. Motorcycles have the same right to be on the road.

Slow down on wet roads

Did you know that roads are the most slippery when it first begins to rain? This is caused by the rainwater mixing with contaminants on the road, such as oil and grease. Make sure to increase your following distance to allow for proper braking.

Watch for animals

Animals are also brushing off the cobwebs and getting out and about in the spring weather, which can pose dangers if they stray onto highways. Slow down so you can stop safely if animals are in the area, and be extra vigilant at dawn and dusk.

Watch for cyclists and pedestrians

More people are choosing to walk, run and cycle to stay active, carry out errands or as an alternative to driving to work, especially when the warmer weather arrives. Treat bicyclists as you would other drivers, and remember pedestrians have rights on the road, too, particularly at crosswalks.
